Do It Yourself Pizza at Woodland Trails

Particularly good on arrival evening or for a shack anytime.



Pepperoni Pizza

You can make a pepperoni pizza in our pizza oven and enjoy it in your room or anywhere inside or outside the B&B. The pizzas are \$11.00 including tax for the two of you. In case no one is available, you are welcome to help yourself to a pizza in the kitchen freezer. The pizza oven and microwave are inside the cupboard in the Dining Room. Pizza cutter, silverware, napkins, etc. are in the drawers below the counter.

Of course, you are welcome to help yourself to our complimentary wine, water and soft drinks.

Do-It-Yourself Grilling. For grilling, you are welcome to bring your food, or purchase it at a local store. We have a small gas grill for your use along with a basket containing plates, silverware, napkins, glasses, salt and pepper and a candle for ambience.

Light Meals in Danbury

(From Woodland Trails, go back to the stop sign on the highway, turn left and cross the St. Croix River into Wisconsin. Danbury is just 4 miles down the road.)



The **Fish Bowl** (so named because this area is known as Wisconsin's Fish Bowl) **Sports Bar** is our first choice for a light meal nearby. Located on Wisconsin Highway 35, two miles north of the stop sign in Danbury, this is the place where the locals go. Their burgers are very good. Steaks include the Whisky River steak, our favorite, and New York strip..

Burl Johnson is the second-generation owner of the Fish Bowl. In the 1970s, Burl's father, Greg, was offered Jim Jordan's Buck, the replica of which hangs over our fireplace, for \$1,500. Thinking it had been taken in Minnesota, Greg turned it down. Bass Pro Shops now owns the original and probably paid the going rate for a trophy buck of \$250,000!

Something special on Friday and Saturday evenings in the summer is at **Amelia's Homestead Café** when Amelia, Julio and their family prepare an authentic Mexican dinner, served with wine or beer if you choose. Portions are very large and splitting an entre is permitted. Located on Danbury's Main Street and they are open from 5 to 9 p.m.

The Deli at St. Croix Casino, Danbury offers quick-serve deli items. In addition, they occasionally feature "Sliders" in the bar area which are small sandwiches of tender roast beef on a bun that some people rave about. Smoking is permitted in the Deli and the Bar but not the Restaurant or Buffet. (See remarks below about the casino's restaurant and buffet.)



Amelia & Julio

Log Cabin Store & Restaurant is open seven days a week and features quick-serve fried chicken, hamburgers, Subway-type sandwiches and ice cream.

Wild Waters, with its log siding front, is located on Danbury's Main Street. Their food is good, especially their stuffed burgers. Their service has been inconsistent and their prices are more city-like.

Light Meals in Siren

In Siren, which is 15 miles south of Danbury, for pizza we recommend The Woiodshed which is located next to Tesora Restaurant at the only stop light in town. Other choices are **Adventures** and the **Pour House.** Both are on the main highway going through town.

Our Recommendations for a Special Dinner

All of the restaurants here can be enjoyed with Woodland Trails Anniversary, Honeymoon and Birthday Specials.



Tesora Restaurant

Located in Siren, Wisconsin, 20 minutes from Woodland Trails.

The two best restaurants in the area are **The Winds** at Grand Casino, Hinckley and **Tesora**.

At Tesora, you are likely to be greeted by owner, Jake Mengelson. This newly redecorated restaurant includes linen tablecloths and napkins. The full menu offers chef-prepared steaks, chicken, fish, pasta plus pizza made in their wood-fired oven.



We recommend calling for a reservation at 715-349-7878. Be sure to mention you are a guest at Woodland Trails!

Getting there is easy. Go to Danbury and turn right at the stop sign on to Wisconsin Hwy 35. Go 15 miles to the only stop *light* you will encounter. Tesora is on the corner.



St. Croix Casino, Danbury

Just 4 miles from Woodland Trails

The St. Croix Casino, Danbury, has The East Winds Restaurant, which is open seven days a week and features hamburgers to chicken, fish, steaks and chops.

The South Winds Buffet is also open daily but seems to have the atmosphere of a high school cafeteria.

The **North Winds Deli** offers hot and cold sandwiches, soups, salads and dessert items.

The **West Winds Lounge** offers complimentary entertainment every weekend. Occasionally featured are "Sliders" which are small sandwiches of tender roast beef on a bun that some people rave about.

Smoking is permitted in the Deli and the Bar but not the Restaurant or Buffet.

Grand Casino, Hinckley

23 miles from Woodland Trails

At **Grand Casino Hinckley, The Winds Steakhouse** is their fine dining option. The food, service and atmosphere are all very good. Prices are city-like with chicken starting at \$20, walleye at \$25 and steaks at \$29. The Winds opens at 5pm Wednesday through Sunday. A caution is that The Winds does not take reservations. They will, however, put you on their waiting list if you call as you are leaving here – 320-384-7771.



Day Trip with a Dining Experience

Enjoy a Day Trip to Duluth, which is a little over an hour away, topped off with an outstanding dinner at Bellisio's.

Bellisio's Italian Restaurant. Located in the **Waterfront Area of Duluth**, Bellisio's is fashioned after the quaint hillside wine markets and local restaurants found in small Italian villages.
